

Code of Practice

After almost three years of work, the draft revised Code of Practice for the care and handling of farm animals has been released for public comment. It is over 60 pages, but you should read it. The code was developed



by a committee of producers, packers, transporters and consumers. Canada's pork producers are leaders in the Canadian agriculture industry when it comes to developing protocols that demonstrate their collective commitment to both animal care and welfare, as well as food safety. This Code will play an important role in the pork industry's ongoing efforts to assess animal care on Canadian pig farms. The requirements and recommended practices in this document represent a challenging balance between animal welfare and the abilities of producers to affect change in an economically viable way. As the code development process involved representatives

with diverse interests, not all parties fully agree with every requirement and recommendation. However, all members agree that this document represents the best achievable balance. Recommended practices encourage continuous improvement in animal care. However, failure to implement recommended practices does not imply that acceptable standards of animal care are not being met. The code is very important to producers because in many provinces, the code is the basic document that, if there's ever a concern about how animals are cared for on the farm, the code is what the judge will need to look at to determine whether the animals have been properly cared for so it becomes in effect a legal or quasi-legal document. It is really important that it is right and works for everybody involved.

Summer Heat and Pigs

Some simple tips to keep pigs eating through the summer heat (from Purina). Heat stress can have a major impact on performance and longevity and pigs may feel heat stressed at temperatures lower than one might think. As temperatures rise, depending upon humidity, pigs can start to experience adverse effects from heat stress, such as reduced feed intake. Heat stressed pigs have a greater potential to experience seasonal infertility, smaller litter sizes, decreased embryo survival rates and death losses, lower libido, lower sperm counts, abnormal sperm and smaller litters. Strategies for adequate air movement and cooling include: ventilation systems, air conditioning units, drip cooling, fresh-air inlets, cool cells, nose coolers and water sprinkler systems. Promote consistent feed consumption. Feed 2 to 3 smaller meals throughout the day. Feed pigs in the night or in the early morning when it is cooler to prevent significant body temperature increases. Switching from two large meals to three small meals has been shown to increase feed intake 10 to15 percent. Provide access to quality water. Make sure the pig has access to fresh, quality water at all times. A pig can consume 5-16 gallons of water per day. Supplying fresh, clean water at constant rates can help pigs meet their water requirements. Keep feed fresh. Feed is more likely to spoil in warm temperatures. Increase the feeding frequency, feed slightly smaller meals and routinely clean the feeding area to keep feed fresh through the summer

CANADIAN SWINE HEALTH BOARD - Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea (PED)

While there are still many unanswered questions about the outbreak of PED in the Midwest US, it is becoming clear that it is now widespread in the US and there are preventive measures Canadian producers should take to protect their herds from this devastating disease. This disease spreads by anything contaminated by manure, notably contaminated trucks and other equipment, so cleaning and disinfecting trucks is an essential measure. Protocols for cleaning and disinfecting trucks: www.swinehealth.ca/publications. The most

important thing producers can do is ensure all trucks entering their farms that may have been in the US have been effectively cleaned and disinfected, including clothing and boots worn by the driver in contact with farms. This approach should be applied to all trucks entering your farm until the extent of the infection in the US is known and the situation is under control. The Canadian Swine Health Intelligence Network (CSHIN) reports that this virus has not been reported in Canada. In fact, reports of severe diarrheas have actually decreased in recent months. Producers are encouraged to ensure that their veterinarian is participating in CSHIN to even further protect our national herd. This disease would have a devastating impact on our Canadian industry, with 70 - 100%




mortality being reported in nursing pigs after three to four days exposure. Since this disease has never been in Canada, our Canadian herd remains very susceptible to PED. Good biosecurity requires extra vigilance and increased compliance, and all producers now have a key role to play in protecting against PED in Canada.

Ontario Pork
